Dear Parents and Carers

Our students have made an excellent start back at school, and the first week after half term has gone well. Those who attended well in the previous half term enjoyed some time on the inflatables yesterday as a reward. I know that the continuation of the bus drivers' strike has caused problems for quite a number of people, however. Thank you so much for all the efforts you are putting into getting your children to school. Scholars' buses continue to run, and we have rarely seen them so full. We are using our own minibus twice a day, and through one of our governors we have been able to hire an additional minibus from a local Scout troop, which is also being driven by members of staff and another one of our governors. We are not able to reach everyone, however, and we thank sincerely those of you who are helping one another out with transport during this difficult time.

This morning we held our annual Remembrance Ceremony. This was a moving event, involving 26 students and watched by some distinguished guests, including the Deputy Lord Lieutenant. Eleven classes also watched the ceremony, and the whole school observed a minute's silence at 11am. As we think about those caught up in two international conflicts, in Israel/Gaza and in Ukraine, the need for remembrance has rarely seemed greater in recent years.

Our Remembrance Ceremony included some familiar ingredients. As well as hearing suitable readings and reading a list of names of those members of our community who have died in war, our students and visitors laid wreaths and planted poppy crosses in our own garden of remembrance. All this can seem very much linked to the past – past conflicts, remembering the dead. After the Last Post and the minute's silence, however, there was the opportunity for our school community to commit itself to work for peace and stability in our world for the future.

Like many of us I expect, I find the idea of 'remembrance' at times difficult. What are we remembering, exactly, when few of us (thankfully) have any real connection with war and sacrifice? How effective is our remembrance, and how sincere our hope for peace, when we seem so keen to wage war on one another all over again in each generation? Yet there is a better way, and remembering the past can be a key to unlocking a better future.

Mrs Kemp also created and presented an assembly for all our students. In it, she explored the work and legacy of the Birtley Belgians, wounded soldiers and refugees from occupied Belgium who were given a place to live in Elisabethville in Birtley during the First World War. These people worked in munitions factories in Birtley, making artillery shells to fire on the front line to reclaim the freedom of their country. Some people from Birtley extended the hand of friendship to the Birtley Belgians, but many were suspicious of them. Some were even jealous of the fact that the Belgians had electricity in their houses and a toilet that flushed, while many who lived in Birtley did not. As Mrs Kemp pointed out, the Belgians might have enjoyed electricity and a flushing toilet, but they had been deprived of their freedom, their homes, their families, and their country.

Most of Elisabethville has now gone, and there are few clues to the former existence of the Birtley Belgians. Their houses and most other buildings have now disappeared, but a few buildings and part of the perimeter fence remain, signs that – if you know where to look and how to interpret the past – there was once a foreign community in the middle of wartime Birtley.

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As Mrs Kemp's assembly reminded us, many people in our area offered a home to refugees from Ukraine last year. Whilst we can't all open our homes to others, we can support charities who are helping refugees. We can raise awareness of these people and the horrors that they are escaping, and we can be kind, helpful and welcoming to those who come to our communities, both from other areas in the UK and from around the world. Here at Lord Lawson, our school is an increasingly diverse community, and we welcome those who come to us from different parts of the country and the world. It is good to see students with different experiences and different heritages getting on so well together, learning tolerance and understanding as they learn alongside one another. Remembrance can seem an abstract and difficult concept, but the legacy we inherit of the sacrifices of previous generations, so we can live together in harmony and freedom, surely deserves a minute's thought at least once a year.




The information below is an extract from the website, and gives you a flavour of what you can expect:
