Dear Parents and Carers

Your bulletin comes one day earlier this week, owing to our school being closed tomorrow for the occasional day.

You may remember that last week was national Anti-Bullying Week, and our school played its part in the week's events. We work hard to make sure that our students are not bullied and that they do not bully others. This is because we recognise that good relationships between students are vital to students' wellbeing and progress. Trust and Respect are two of our school values. Ms Barron is our Anti-Bullying Coordinator, and she works with a team of anti-bullying ambassadors and with our pastoral leaders to promote understanding of what bullying is, why it is wrong, and what to do about it if students feel they are being bullied or they witness bullying. Ms Barron and her team take all reports of bullying very seriously, and they act quickly to intervene and to resolve issues.

Any student who has concerns, for themselves or for others, can speak to any member of staff, or they can write a note and post it in one of the drop boxes that are in the student entrance and in year bases. As a result of the work that is done at Lord Lawson, incidents of bullying have been greatly reduced. New students who come to Lord Lawson frequently comment to us about how they very quickly feel safe and how little bullying there is here. We are not complacent about this, however: we would like to eliminate bullying altogether.

We understand what an emotive subject bullying can be. Sometimes the situation is complex; a bully can also be a victim, and a victim can lash out at others. We always ask students, parents and carers to work closely with us so we can resolve any issues. Occasionally I receive complaints that have been made to the local authority or Ofsted, but about issues that have not been made known to us. Please understand that the local authority and Ofsted have no power to investigate complaints. Instead, they ask parents and carers to follow the school's processes, because that is the best way to reach a resolution.

Through their activities last week, including odd socks day and a bake sale, students and members of staff also raised a considerable sum of money for the Anti-Bullying Alliance. As part of Anti-Bullying Week, students were given the opportunity to 'make a noise' about bullying. Some students chose to write poems on the subject and to enter them for our competition. Later in this bulletin you will see some winning examples of these poems. I hope you enjoy reading these as much as I did.

Above all, our message to students is not to be a bystander: if you see bullying, you need to call it out. Our students support one another, and they are able to help one another. In his 1867 lecture at St Andrews University, the philosopher John Stuart Mill said, "Let not any one pacify his conscience by the delusion that he can do no harm if he takes no part, and forms no opinion. Bad men need nothing more to compass their ends, than that good men should look on and do nothing." In slightly more modern terms, we understand that to do nothing when we see bad things happening is to be complicit in these bad acts. A 'No Bystanders' culture can change this.

I hope you and your families enjoy the long weekend. School begins again as usual on Monday morning, for the start of the last four weeks of term.
