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Dear Parents and Carers

I am writing to you inform you that you are now able to view your child's report on My Child at School (MCAS). This is the second report this academic year and provides vital information about the progress that your child is making following the spring assessments. If you have forgotten your login details for MCAS, please email: lordlawson.academy and provide your child's name and tutor group.

The information below provides a guide to the report and what it contains, to help you and your child to discuss it together:

- Attendance we define good attendance as being 96% or higher. We know that students with this level of attendance achieve better in their A levels as a result.
- Predicted grade this is the grade that the teacher *currently estimates* that your child will achieve in their final A levels.
- Spring Assessment this is the grade the students achieved in their internal assessments in February. It is used as part of the evidence for teachers to decide the predicted grade
- Target grade this is the grade that your child should be achieving. It is based on them making average
 progress from the start to the end of sixth form.
- Attitude to learning this reflects the engagement your child has with their learning. (Please refer to the descriptors attached).
- Independent study this reflects the engagement your child has with the additional study needed to progress fully in their subjects. (Please refer to the descriptors attached).
- Home learning negative points this reflects the negative points for homework not being completed and or homework deadlines being missed.

It is important that you compare the predicted grade against the target grade. If your child is on or above target, then they are on track to make average or above average progress. However, if your child is below target then they are not making the required progress. Students who fall into this category, for any of their subjects, will no longer be able to leave site during their 'free' periods. This is to ensure that all classwork, homework, and independent study work, is completed fully and that support and intervention can happen within school.

Please discuss your child's report with them and encourage your child to speak to their teachers to ensure they know exactly what they need to do to make further progress.
